Old Business

Project LEAP/Proyecto VIDA Recruitment Tables - Williams reported that the Office of Support is working on finalizing the dates for Project LEAP/Proyecto VIDA recruitment tables. These tables are set up at different Ryan White funded agencies. Ronnie Galley accepted the role of coordinating the dates and will need help with staffing the tables. Members that signed up to assist with recruitment efforts are Kesh Locks, Ryan Rose, Tony Crawford, Skeet Boyle, Diondra English, Rodrigo Arias, and Kenia Gallardo.

Road 2 Success/Blue Book JEOPARDY - Williams explained that the Road to Success program involves committee members hosting HIV educational meetings in the community and engaging others in activities such as Blue Book JEOPARDY. This committee is working with the Consumer & Community Engagement and Education Workgroup since its goal is to educate consumers as well. More information is provided in the following sections.

EHE/Integrated HIV Prevention and Care Plan - Williams provided a brief overview of EHE/Integrated Planning and discussed the workgroup/committee's goals. Williams also shared the May 2024 EHE/Integrated Planning Activities Summary Report, see attached.

Calls with local colleges and universities - Williams stated that assistance is still needed to make calls for the College Workgroup. Volunteers are needed to collect information about HIV services on campus from various colleges and universities in the Greater Houston Area. The survey form will be distributed via email and can be printed for those who require a hard copy.

What is Project LEAP?

A free 17-week training course for individuals living with or affected by HIV to gain the knowledge and skills they need to help plan HIV prevention and care services in the Houston Area. Topics covered include HIV 101, a history of HIV in the Houston area, local HIV trends, services for people living with HIV and much, much more!

Project L.E.A.P.

Learning, Empowerment, Advocacy and Participation

What is Project L.E.A.P.? Project L.E.A.P. is a free, 17-week comprehensive advocacy training course for individuals living with and affected by HIV in the Greater Houston Area. The goal is to train people living with HIV so that they become active participants in local HIV planning activities by serving on a planning body, such as the Ryan White Planning Council or the City of Houston HIV Prevention Community Planning Group (CPG).

What will I Learn? *Some of the topics covered in class include:*

- Parliamentary Procedure (Robert's Rules of Order)
- HIV 101
- The History of HIV in the Houston Area
- HIV trends in the Houston area for populations such as African Americans, Hispanics, Women, Youth, Heterosexuals, Transgender, etc.
- HIV trends in the Houston area and available services for people with mental health issues, substance abuse issues, the homeless and the incarcerated/recently released.
- HIV and Co-infections, HIV and Chronic Diseases, HIV and Stigma
- Designing HIV Services
- The Ryan White Program Service Prioritization and Funding Allocation Process
- HIV Prevention in the Houston Area

Additional class activities may include:

- Attend a Ryan White Planning Council and Committee meeting.
- Attend an HIV Prevention Community Planning Group (CPG) Meeting.
- Attend a community meeting of your choice.
- Leadership skills and team building.
- Introduction to National, State, and Local HIV plans.
- Class Needs Assessment project and presentation to the Planning Council.

Day class: 10:00 am – 2:00 pm

Evening class: 5:30 pm – 9:30 pm

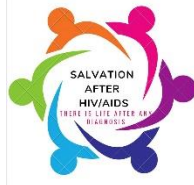

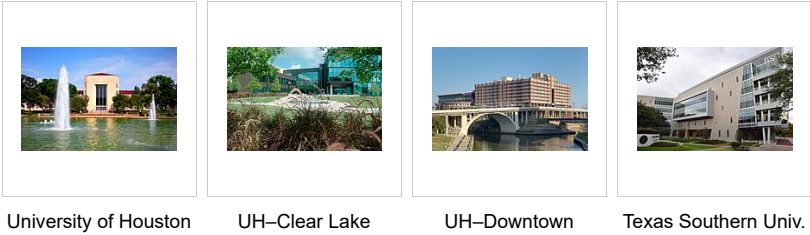

The university is organized into eight schools offering 40 undergraduate degree programs,^[13] 51 masters programs, and 29 doctoral programs.^{[14][15]}
